In 1836 Walker, a merchant marine from Cape Cod, tried to establish a colony in Mexico for American slaves. Walker was punished for sailing Florida fugitives to freedom in 1844 by authorities who hot branded his right hand. In 1852 Walker operated a station on the Underground Railroad in Wisconsin, and then twelve years later went to Virginia to teach farm and trade skills to former slaves.

Jonathan Walker was immortalized by John Greenleaf Whittier's poem "The Man with the Branded Hand" in which Greenleaf interpreted the SS (slave stealing) brand to mean *Salvation to the Slave.* Walker's proud family carries the names of the abolitionists after whom the Walkers named their children.
